From the Pastor

For their Vacation Bible School project this year, two of our confirmands, Dan Crowder and Kelsey Trimble, prepared a program on Papua New Guinea and presented it to the adult class. They spoke about the culture of Papua New Guinea, showed a video of Lutheran churches in that country, including St. Michael's companion congregation, and cooked and served mixed vegetables with coconut cream and banana pancakes, two native PNG dishes.

Here's what Dan and Kelsey found out:

Papua New Guinea is a group of islands located north of Australia. The population is over 4 million people and the main language is pidgin English. The Evangelical Lutheran Church of PNG has a membership of 600,000 to 800,000 members, which is about 20% of the nation's population. There are 2,223 congregations and 671 pastors. The main churchwide functions for the ELC-PNG are evangelism, education, ministerial training, medical services, and the finance/economics of self-support. St. Michael's companion congregation is Soi Lutheran Church in the town of Bialla on the island of New Britain. Bialla is in the western part of New Britain, which is sparsely populated and undeveloped. Soi Lutheran Church recently completed a new church building; they have about 400 members and an average worship attendance of 240 per week.

In the weeks and months to come, we will be sending letters to our brothers and sisters in PNG. My prayer is that we will be able to form a relationship in which we share our oneness in Christ. Last summer, a delegation from the Virginia Synod traveled to PNG and made a video of their trip. In the video, Bishop Mauney speaks of Christ stretching out his arms on the cross. In one hand, Christ holds Virginia and in the other PNG. When Christ brings his hands together, we who are a world apart are brought together. I have a file of information on PNG and Soi Lutheran Church as well as the video of last year's trip. If you would like to borrow them and/or use them for a class or meeting, just let me know.

LET'S KNIT OR CROCHET Together!

Come to Church **Saturday**, **July 12th** from 10 to 12. I'll bring the shawl I'm working on and some extra yarn for practice. If you have some big needles bring them (size 10 or 11) If you crochet, I found a pattern for you, but I don't crochet so can't help much with that!

I found both patterns on the internet. Here are both **knitting AND crocheting** patterns:

"This pattern gives a sample of how to make a knit or crocheted shawl. Your individual choices in yarn and needle/hook size will affect the finished size and thickness of the shawl, but there isn't one "right" way.

Because crochet uses more yarn than knit, a crochet shawl will be a bit smaller than a knit one made with the same number of yarn skeins. To make a larger one, start with a longer chain and use an additional skein

REPORT ON THE SIXTEENTH ANNUAL ASSEMBLY OF THE VIRGINIA SYNOD ROANOKE COLLEGE, May 30 – June 1, 2003

We were privileged to represent St. Michael Lutheran Church as voting delegates to the 2003 annual meeting of the Virginia Synod. **Purpose of the Assembly**: to care for necessary items of business, participate in and experience corporate worship, be inspired by the theme program and speakers and engage in fellowship as *Ambassadors for Christ*. The Rev. **Mark R. Moller-Gunderson**, Executive Director, Division for Congregational Ministries, ELCA was the ELCA Representative and keynote speaker.

Assembly Theme: Ambassadors for Christ, Stewards of the Kingdom. This Synod includes all churches of the *EvangelicalLutheran Churchin America* in The Commonwealth of Virginia (except NOVA) and Bluefield, West Virginia. Business (plenary) sessions were held Friday afternoon and evening, Saturday morning and afternoon, and Sunday morning. Additional events included a youth led service, small group discussions, *To the Castle (musical on stewardship)*, worship services and Holy Communion. All activities were held at Roanoke College with one exception that being Saturday evening worship and Holy Communion at St. Andrew's Catholic Church.

For voting purposes, each church represented is entitled to a minimum of two (2) delegates *plus* their minister(s). It was reported from the podium that there was a possibility of 259 ministers and 349 lay delegates for a total of 608 voting members and there were 313 present which met the quorum needed of 304.

Pastor Mitchell summarized well in her sermon the following week: "..... For three days, we pondered the ways in which stewardship is the giving of our lives and hearts to the God who gives us all things. We heard and voted on resolutions that had to do with our life as the church. We elected leaders and met in small groups to share ways in which God is at work in our lives. We considered the Synod's budget for 2004 – a bare bones spending plan, which reflects some tough decisions and even reductions because of decreased giving from our synod's congregations. If the assembly had just been about the budget, it would have been a depressing time. But through all the proposals and reports and voting, we were able to see how the VirginiaSynod is carryingout the work of God far and wide. We met representatives of new mission congregations in growing areas of Virginia. We heard stories of how together we are preparing seminary students to be pastors and leaders in the church, how we have reached out to those in poverty, how we have provided help to foster families and children who have found it difficult to thrive in public school and families who wish to grow through adoption. We learned more about our work with Lutheran World Relief – offering help and hope to those throughout the world who need food and shelter and other resources because those things are in short supply where they live. As the sharing of powerful ministries continued throughout the weekend, we became aware two sides of the story – a synod struggling with limited resources on the one hand, and carrying out vibrant ministries on the other."

Very brief notes on business items:

BUDGET for fiscal year ending 1/31/05 approved at \$2,132,977. This is a slight increase – about \$70,000 over the current approved budget—with serious reductions in some categories. There was long, sometimes emotional discussion over beginning salaries for new ministers.

There was also a long, sometimes emotional discussion concerning retired ministers remaining as members of the congregations they last served. The current policy was sent back to the ELCA for clarification/modification.

A resolution opposing blessings of same gender relationships and reaffirming the ELCA's ordination policy regarding homosexuals was tabled to the 2004 Assembly.

Synod Council has 16 members – includes 3 elected officers and Bishop James F. Mauney. The new Synod Vice President is **Mark Reed**, an attorney and member of St. Mark in Luray. **W. Martin Paulson**, member of **Shiloh Lutheran** continues to serve as a member of Synod Council -- his term expires 2004.

OTHER:

Exhibit Area: There were about a dozen manned tables with exhibits representing approved programs and activities of interest. We found this highly educational and helpful.

"To The Castle": First Lutheran of Norfolk presented a stewardship drama/musical lasting approximately 45 minutes. Outstanding!

Songs in the Daily Worship (see booklet), music and program were impressive. Particularly impressive was the group called **Kingdom Stompers** led by three pastors of the Shenandoah Valley area.

YOUTH ASSEMBLY REPORT: "Evangelism (recruiting new members) is a serious weakness of the church"....."mission work is needed throughout the world....when did you last invite someone to your church?"

ELCA PRIORITIES: Priorities in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America are: 1) growing in numbers and outreach; 2) strengthening our churches and 3) growing spiritually.

Attendance from nearby churches included Archie and Mabel Montgomery from New Mt. Zion; Martin Paulson and Jay Lee Wall from Shiloh.

For those interested in additional information, we left at the church 32 photographs, two VCR tapes (9 minutes and 45 minutes), a filled three-ring binder, daily worship booklets, several other publications and miscellaneous items.
