Seasons of the Church

According to home calendars, there are four seasons. The church has seasons too, but there are six of them. Three seasons center around Jesus' birth. They are Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. The other three center around Jesus' resurrection. They are Lent, Easter, and Pentecost. When you put those six seasons of the church together, you have the "liturgical year." Just like spring, summer, winter, and fall, each season of the liturgical year has its own colors and things to do.

The Season of Advent November 30 – December 24

In the liturgical year, the first Sunday of Advent starts the new year...not January 1. Advent begins on the 4th Sunday before Christmas Day and ends at sunset on Christmas Eve. Advent is from the Latin word for **coming**. The color for Advent is royal blue or purple. Advent is a season of anticipation – a time to prepare our hearts and homes for the celebration of Jesus' birth.

Many churches and homes have Advent wreaths. The Advent wreath had its roots in the pagan religions of northern Europe—a solstice practice calling for the return of the sun in the dark time of the year by lighting candles placed on a cartwheel decorated with evergreen. Lutheran Christians living in sixteenth century Eastern Europe appropriated this earlier custom for their own and filled it with Christian symbolism. As early as the Middle Ages, Christians used this fire/light symbolism to represent Christ's coming into the world. It became the basis for the Advent wreath, a sign of the waiting and hopeful expectation of the return in glory of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The advent wreath is a circle with no beginning and no end to remind Christians that God's love is never ending. The evergreens are a sign of the faithfulness of God to His people, even in death, and the lighted candles are a reminder of the light that Christ brought into the world. One candle is lit on the First Sunday of Advent and then, one more is lit on each of the following Sundays until all four are burning. On Christmas Eve we light the middle white candle...the Christ candle.

We need the message and season of Advent, for without it we cannot truly focus on the meaning of Christmas. During the four weeks of Advent we wait, we hope, we prepare to receive the promised Savior—in each of his three comings. Christ came to us as a

baby at Bethlehem over two thousand years ago. He comes to us today repeatedly in Word and Sacrament. He will come to us victoriously over evil at the end of time.

Come, Lord Jesus!
