Seasons of the Church

According to home calendars, there are four seasons. The church has seasons, too, but there are six of them. Three seasons center around Jesus' birth. They are Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. The other three center around Jesus' resurrection. They are Lent, Easter, and Pentecost. When you put those six seasons of the church together, you

have the "liturgical year." Just like spring, summer, winter, and fall, each season of the liturgical year has its own colors and things to do.

The Christmas Season December 25 - January 5

Christmas is the second season in the church year. The color of Christmas and the Christmas season is white, a color that is used on all the great festivals connected with Jesus. It is the color of purity and holiness. Christmas symbols include the manger where Jesus was born and the star that shined over Bethlehem. Angels who announced Jesus' birth and shepherds who were the first to come and worship the baby Jesus are also used as symbols. The rose and holly are Christmas symbols as well. Each have thorns and red flowers or red berries that remind us of Jesus' suffering and the bloodshed on the cross.

Christmas, the observance of Christ's birth, was first celebrated by the western church which was centered in Rome, and later spread to the eastern part of the church. The date of December 25 was chosen to compete with pagan festivals celebrating the first day of winter, such as the rebirth of the sun-god. Around December 21 the earth turns and each day brings us more minutes of light. In ancient times this period was filled with great celebrations--all would not die, the sun was being reborn--it was a time to decorate the cold houses with evergreens and light the candles. The increasing darkness was reversed. The fourth century Christians recognized the similarity between the solstice, the return of natural light, and the nativity of the Lord--the coming of God's light in human form. In the birth of Jesus, God enters the dying world. The light shines, and the darkness cannot overcome it.

Christian Christmas is different from secular Christmas in that it begins, rather than concludes, on the evening of December 24. It lasts twelve days--not twelve hours. Christian Christmas is the beginning of joy, not the end of it. Christians celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ who is "Immanuel", which means "God is with us" (Matthew 1:23). He is the Messiah and Savior promised by the Old Testament prophets. On this day that has become a time for giving and receiving gifts, Christians are to remember that Jesus is the greatest gift of all.

PROCLAMATION OF THE BIRTH OF CHRIST

Today, the twenty-fifth day of December, unknown ages from the time when God created the heavens and the earth and then formed man and woman in his own image.

Several thousand years after the flood, when God made the rainbow shine forth as a sign of the covenant. Twenty-one centuries from the time of Abraham and Sarah; thirteen centuries after Moses led the people of Israel out of Egypt.

Eleven hundred years from the time of Ruth and the Judges; one thousand years from the anointing of David as king; in the sixty-fifth week according to the prophecy of Daniel.

In the one hundred and ninety-fourth Olympiad; the seven hundred and fifty-second year from the foundation of the city of Rome.

The forty-second year of the reign of Octavian Augustus; The whole world being at peace, Jesus Christ, the eternal God and Son of the eternal Father, desiring to sanctify the world by his most merciful coming, being conceived by the Holy Spirit and nine months having passed since his conception, was born in Bethlehem of Judea of the Virgin Mary.

Today is the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ according to the flesh.
