Who is a Primary Candidate? The Call (search) Committee carefully and prayerfully looks at all potential pastoral candidates who are submitted through the Bishop's office. The committee uses the congregational survey and evaluation tools supplied by the Bishop. The committee may choose to interview some and a primary candidate may emerge. The candidate is then asked if he or she is willing to become the

primary candidate. If he or she says "yes", then that person is "..NOT to be under consideration anywhere else until this possibility is resolved. Also, the Call Committee is to explore no other possibilities until this candidate's call is either extended or fails to come before the church council or congregation for a vote." "...Confidentiality is a **must**. The careers of pastors may be jeopardized if news of their consideration is prematurely divulged." (quotes from *Handbook for the Call Process of the VA Synod*)

#### **Seasons of the Church**

According to home calendars, there are four seasons. The church has seasons, too, but there are six of them. Three seasons center around Jesus' birth. They are Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. The other three center around Jesus' resurrection. They are Lent, Easter, and Pentecost. When you put those six seasons of the church together, you have the "liturgical year." Just like spring, summer, winter, and fall, each season of the liturgical year has its own colors and things to do.

### Ash Wednesday

The Season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and continues for 40 days, ending on the eve of Easter. The exact date of Ash Wednesday is set according to the date of Easter, which changes every year.

Ash Wednesday is named for the practice of imposing ashes and emphasizes the confession of sins. We confess that our sin leads to death. Using ashes as a sign of

repentance is an ancient practice that is mentioned often in the Bible. The early Christians adopted the use of ashes from the Jewish practice as an external mark of penitence (being sorry for sins).

Our predecessors were often so tortured for their faith that some

became apostates, ones who denied their beliefs. Later, when persecution subsided, these same apostates repented and wanted to rejoin the worshipping community. The church established public penance—including the wearing of sackcloth and ashes—as a condition for re-entry. This mild form of suffering reminded apostates that during their absence, the faithful had suffered profoundly. Some had even died. However, singling out apostates with ashes suggested that they were the only ones in need of forgiveness. Church leaders knew better and Lent was set aside as a time when all would examine their own sinfulness and ask God's forgiveness.

The confession of sins and imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, a season of penitence. We join in the observance of Ash Wednesday to remind ourselves that we, too, are sinners in need of God's compassion and mercy. Ashes are applied with the minister's thumb in the form of a small cross of the forehead with the words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Ashes symbolize several aspects of our human existence.

- \* Ashes remind us of God's condemnation of sin, as God said to Adam, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return."
- \* Ashes suggest cleansing and renewal. Ashes were used in ancient times in the absence of soap. On Ash Wednesday, ashes are a penitential substitute for water as a reminder of our baptism.
- \* Ashes remind us of the shortness of human life, as is said when we are buried, "earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust."
- \* Ashes are a symbol of our need to repent, confess our sings and return to God.

The color for Ash Wednesday is purple, the color for penitence, or black for the color of ashes. The cross is also a symbol of Ash Wednesday.

Our Ash Wednesday service will be held on February 25 at 7 p.m. We will be observing the season of Lent at mid-week worship services with our friends of the New River Parish.
