#### Seasons of the Church

According to home calendars, there are four seasons. The church has seasons, too, but there are six of them. Three seasons center around Jesus' birth. They are Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. The other three center around Jesus' resurrection. They are Lent, Easter, and Pentecost. When you put those six seasons of the church together, you have the "liturgical year." Just like spring, summer, winter, and fall, each season of the liturgical year has its own colors and things to do.

#### Palm (or Passion) Sunday

**Palm Sunday** is the final Sunday in Lent. This year Palm Sunday is April 4. Traditionally, the final Sunday of Lent has celebrated Jesus' entry into Jerusalem when the people waved palm branches, shouted "Hosanna" and greeted him as a King. Jesus entered Jerusalem humbly seated on the back of a colt. This colt had never been ridden before and the disciples simple threw their coats on its back for Jesus to sit on. This day may also be observed as a time to remember the events that led to Jesus' suffering and death on a cross – Passion Sunday.

Purple, a royal color, is the color for Palm Sunday and reminds us that Jesus is King. If the day is observed as Passion Sunday, scarlet—a reminder of the blood Jesus shed on the cross—may be used.

Palm branches as well as a crown with palm branches are important symbols. The donkey Jesus rode into Jerusalem is a reminder that Jesus is a servant king, since other royalty of that time would have ridden on horses. The crown of thorns and the kingly crown bring the message of Palm Sunday and Passion Sunday together showing the victory of Jesus as Lord of all, and the suffering of Jesus as the world's savior.

#### Holy Week

**Holy Week** follows Palm Sunday and lasts until Easter Sunday. This week includes Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil. Holy Week is a time to remember the events that led up to Jesus' suffering and death on a cross.

**Maundy Thursday** recalls the night when Jesus shared a Passover meal with his disciples. The "Maundy" comes from a Latin Bible translation of John 13:34, *mandatum novum*, which means a "new commandment." At this meal Jesus washed his disciples' feet and commanded them to love one another. He also told them that the bread and wine they shared were his body and blood, given and shed to forgive sins. Christians continue to share the bread and wine in the Sacrament of Holy Communion, the Lord's Supper.

**Good Friday** is the day we remember Jesus' death on a cross. This would be the saddest day of the church year, except that Jesus' death was not the end but the beginning of new life for all who trust in Him.

**Easter Vigil** takes place on the Saturday before Easter Sunday. The service takes worshippers from darkness into the light of the resurrection. During the early church, the Easter Vigil was the instruction of candidates prior to their baptism. Candles are lit in anticipation of Easter, when the light of Christ overcomes the powers of darkness—sin, Satin, and death.

The colors of Holy Week are scarlet or white for Maundy Thursday, black or no color at all for Good Friday and white for the Vigil of Easter. Bread and wine (wheat and grapes) are symbols for Maundy Thursday as well as the water bowl and towel, which Jesus used to clean his disciples' feet. The cross and crown of thorns are common symbols for Good Friday.

#### **Easter**

**Easter** is celebrated on the first Sunday after the first full moon falling on or after March 21, the first day of Spring. That is why Easter can be as early as March 22 and as late as April 25. This way of dating Easter makes it fall just after the Jewish celebration of Passover, since the first Easter took place on the third day after Passover.

Easter is the oldest festival of the church and the most important day of the church year because it celebrates Jesus being raised from death. His "resurrection" means that God has defeated the powers of evil and death, so that all who trust in Christ may one day live with God forever. In the early church Easter was a time for Baptism. Plunging the believers under the baptismal water and pulling them out again were strong reminders of Jesus' own death and resurrection.

The color of Easter and the Easter Season is white or gold. White is used for seasons of celebration and gladness and symbolizes purity and joy. Gold symbolizes the riches of God's grace. The empty cross and empty tomb are Easter symbols. Colorful butterflies, which come out of dark cocoons, and blooming flowers, which grow from seeds planted in the ground, are also symbols of Easter's new life.

Burn and Betty Gross will share their experiences in the Holy Land. **Potluck lunch at 11:30 a.m. – bring your friends and family – and wear an Easter bonnet (or cap)**
