Seasons of the Church

According to home calendars, there are four seasons. The church has seasons, too, but there are six of them. Three seasons center around Jesus' birth. They are Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. The other three center on Jesus' resurrection. They are Lent, Easter, and Pentecost. When you put those six seasons of the church together, you have the "liturgical year." Just like spring, summer, winter, and fall, each season of the liturgical year has its own colors and things to do.

Reformation Day

Reformation Day is October 31, but the festival is celebrated in churches either on that day when it falls on a Sunday or on the last Sunday of October.

On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther nailed his Ninety-five Theses to the church door at Wittenberg, Germany. This list of statements was meant to start a discussion about changes in the Roman Catholic Church. Martin Luther did not know that his list would eventually lead to a division in the church or to the formation of the group known as "Lutherans." Reformation is a Lesser Festival of the church, which means that its celebration is optional, but it has become a very popular festival in the Protestant Church. The day focuses on the important teachings of the Reformation-salvation by God's grace and the priesthood of all believers.

The color for Reformation Day is red -- the color of fire, life, and blood. One symbol of Reformation Day is the oil lamp, a symbol for God's Word and for Christian knowledge. Another symbol is Luther's seal. While a professor at Wittenburg, Luther devised the seal, which he declared was meant to be "expressive of his theology." The following explanation of the seal is from a letter Luther wrote to a friend:

"The first thing expressed in my seal is a cross, black, within the heart, to put me in mind that faith in Christ crucified saves us. 'For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness.' Now, although the cross is black, mortified, and intended to cause pain, yet it does not change the color of the heart, does not destroy nature -- i.e., does not kill, but keeps alive. 'For the just shall live by faith,' -- by faith in the Savior. But this heart is fixed upon the center of a white rose, to show that faith causes joy, consolation and peace. The rose is white, not red, because white is the ideal color of all angels and blessed spirits. This rose, moreover, is fixed in a sky-colored ground, to denote that such joy of faith in the spirit is but an earnest and beginning of heavenly joy to come, as anticipated and held by hope, though not yet revealed. And around this ground base is a golden ring, to signify that such bliss in heaven is endless, and more precious than all joys and treasures, since gold is the best and most precious metal. Christ, our dear Lord, He will give grace unto eternal life."

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

In our planning session on September 12, 2004, nearly 30 people gathered to evaluate the ministries of St. Michael in 12 different categories ranging from Mission to Dynamic Worship to Space and Facilities. The evaluation process is designed to help the congregation identify and claim our strengths for ministry. With the help of Pastor John Wertz, Sr., the group chose three strengths of St. Michael to focus on in order to continue to grow the ministry of the congregation. The three strengths selected were *Dynamic Worship*, *Pastoral and Lay Visitation* and *Competent Programs and Activities*. As we grow stronger in each of these areas, we will be fulfilling the mission statement we have established for ourselves and growing in our mission and ministry in the community. This month, the council will consider the information from the planning session and suggest possible ways to move forward in these areas. Thank you for helping St. Michael plan for the future. Look for more ways that you can be involved in growing these strengths in the next few months.
