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## **Hope Is Stronger**

Because of the tragedy at Virginia Tech, we have experienced pain and grief on a scale that most of us could have never imagined. I am convinced, however, that hope is stronger than pain and grief. In the days since the tragedy, I have seen signs of hope all around us. I have seen our community gather together to support each other in powerful and meaningful ways. I have seen people planting flowers and children playing soccer games on a beautiful spring day. I have seen expressions of love pour in from places as varied as South Carolina and North Dakota. I have seen the community of God's people reach out to those in need and I have experienced times of worship that have reminded me than nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

At the Convocation at Virginia Tech, the poet, Nikki Giovanni, stood up and said, "We are Virginia Tech. We will prevail." As I thought about her words, it occurred to me that as Christians, we can boldly proclaim, "We are children of God. God has prevailed." While nothing can take away the pain and loss of April 16, the good news, the hope, that shines brightly in the darkness is that God so loved the world that He gave his only Son that all those who believed in him might share in the promise of eternal life. Thanks to Jesus' death and resurrection, God has prevailed over the power of sin and death forever. The pain and loss we all experienced was strong, but the hope that comes from knowing both that Christ is victorious over death and that God is always with us is far, far stronger.

## **Filling Your Toolbox: Facing Grief**

The emotions we face in a time of tragedy and pain can feel overwhelming and difficult to understand. The following information is from "The Lutheran Handbook" pages 120-122. While this information can=t fix or take away your pain and grief, it can give you some insight into normal responses to loss and tragedy and offers some ideas for how you can offer consolation to others.

#### **How to Cope With Loss and Grief**

#### 1. Familiarize yourself with the stages of grief.

Experts identify five: denial, anger, bargaining, depression and acceptance. Some add hope as a sixth stage. Grieving persons cycle back and forth through the stages, sometimes experiencing two or three in a single day. This is normal.

### 2. Express your grief.

Healthy ways may include crying, staring into space for extended periods, ruminating, shouting at the ceiling, and sudden napping. Laughing outbursts are also appropriate and should not be judged harshly.

## 3. Identify someone you trust to talk to.

Available people can include a spouse, parents, relatives, friends, a pastor, a doctor, or a trained counselor.

### 4. Choose a personal way to memorialize the loss.

Make a collage of photographs or start a scrapbook of memories to memorialize the event. This helps you to begin to heal without getting stuck in your grief.

#### Be Aware

- \$ The pain immediately after suffering a loss is usually deep and intense. This will lessen with the passage of time.
- \$ Even Jesus cried when his friend Lazarus died (John 11:35).

#### Resources Available

Both Augsburg Fortress and Thrivent donated books about dealing with grief and loss to St. Michael. The books are available in the Fellowship Hall and in the front hallway. The books are free. Please take what you need for you or for a friend or co-worker who might be helped by the book.

As additional resources become available, they will be posted on St. Michael's web site: www.st-michael-lutheran-church.org. The site currently includes prayers and a copy of Pastor John's sermon from April 22, 2007.

## **Facilities Expansion Task Force Update**

Following approval of the funding request at the Congregational Meeting on March 11, the Facilities Expansion Task Force contacted four architects who have agreed to participate in the Architectural Study Process. Each architect is developing preliminary design concepts which will be presented to the Task Force on Saturday, May 19. The Task Force will review the presentations and make recommendations to the Congregational Council regarding the possibilities for expanding our facilities. The Council will discuss the Task Force recommendations at its meeting on June 3 and then make recommendations to the congregation. The Council's recommendations will be formally presented to the congregation at a Congregational Meeting on Sunday, June 17. For more information on the work of the Facilities Expansion Task Force, please talk with Pastor John or any of the Task Force members.

## Congregational Meeting on June 17 at 10:00 a.m

St. Michael will have a congregational meeting on Sunday, June 17 at 10 a.m. to consider recommendations from the Council regarding possible facilities expansion. In addition, the congregation will also be reaffirming the six trustees of the congregation. All six, Jeff Birch, Jim Clemens, Betty Gross, Fran Shepherd, Ben Simmers and Dave Surface, have been elected at previous meetings, but our lawyer has asked that we affirm all six at one meeting so that all six names will appear in one place in the minutes of a congregational meeting.

#### St. Michael Mission Endowment Fund

With approval at the March 11 Congregational Meeting, the St. Michael Mission Endowment Fund is now officially a part of the ministry of the congregation. The purpose of the Mission Endowment Fund is to provide for mission work beyond the normal operating budget of the congregation in the following areas of ministry: Youth and Family Ministry, Caring and Sharing Outreach Ministry, Music Ministry, Major Maintenance and Improvement, and Scholarship Funds.
