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## Twelve Keys for Living

Several years ago, my friend, Dr. Kennon Callahn wrote a book entitled *Twelve Keys for Living: Possibilities for a Whole, Healthy Life*. The book is not a step-by-step guide to fix your life, but rather a discussion of the twelve different strengths that he has observed in whole, healthy lives. The twelve keys are : mission, compassion, hope, community, leadership, simplicity, joy, wisdom, encouragement, creativity, health and generosity. Dr. Callahan describes the twelve keys in this way:

Keys open doors. The twelve keys open doors for a whole, healthy life. . .  
. These twelve keys help you open the doors to advancing and growing, building and developing your life. I call these twelve keys “possibilities” because they are, in fact, potential ways you can grow forward. I shy away from referring to them as virtues or values. Those terms raise the specter of “should,” “ought,” “must,” “law.” We are people of grace, not law. These twelve keys are possibilities, generously available to you.”

I found the book and the twelve possibilities he discusses to be extremely helpful for me and I would like to share these keys for living with you in the Adult Class during Vacation Bible School. ## **Filling Our Toolbox: Where is God in our grief and pain?**

We are people of the empty tomb and the risen Lord. We believe that God in Christ Jesus enters into our grief and pain and that through Christ's death and resurrection, God ultimately overcomes the power of death. We live knowing the promise of eternal life with God. While the promise doesn't take away our pain, it gives us hope.

As Lutheran Christians, we do not ask, "Why did God allow this to happen?", because we don't believe that God causes evil. God is good. We certainly believe that God knows what will happen. God is omnipotent, but knowing something will occur and causing something to occur are different. God gives us free will. We live in a world where sin is a reality and unfortunately evil acts in our world. The question we ask is, "Where is God in all of this?", because this question helps us to see the presence of our loving God. We see God's presence through the community of God's believers that gathers together in times of grief and pain. We see God's presence through the professionals who use their gifts to provide help and hope and through the resources that are made available to us. We see God's presence through the words of Scripture and times of prayer which bring us comfort and peace. Pain and grief can make it difficult at times to see God's presence even when it is all around us, but as the Apostle Paul reminds us in Romans nothing "will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."



## RETURN FROM PAPUA NEW GUINEA

Greetings from Papua New Guinea (PNG). Soi Lutheran Church, our sister congregation, sends their greetings to St. Michael Lutheran Church. The people are so wonderful, so gracious, so loving. Some teenage girls made me yarn flowers, and I made room in the suitcase to bring them home. All the churches in the Bialla District were happy to see us and I enjoyed the sing-sings with all women. I received a painting made by an eleven year old young man, whose name is Israel, who wanted it to be displayed in our Sunday School room. The painting is his gift to St. Michael and is now in the Fellowship Hall at church. His mother, Rose, befriended us immeasurably and I will write about her in another newsletter.

Our mission team of three women from the Virginia Synod visited eight Lutheran churches, but the people from many other Lutheran churches came to each stop we made. When we went to Bialla, all the parishes were there to greet us, and the women from four other churches made presentations. Soi is currently made up of three parishes; all were present to greet me. My name is now 'Mama Sokana' to stand for Soi, Kabaya, and Navo, the three parishes that are connected. When we were at Bethel, Kimbe, four other churches came to be with us and to worship with us on Easter morning.

We visited many schools, and Soi Primary School had each grade level do a presentation. They do not receive many American visitors, so they went all out for us. We also went to the three Lutheran Seminaries in PNG, which was quite meaningful. The students are so grateful for the opportunity to visit with us and we greatly enjoyed meeting them. One of the seminaries needs a volunteer English teacher and I am considering that calling. Please pray for me to be given guidance and discernment about this.

During our visits to the Elementary, Primary, and High Schools, we discovered that they are in great need of library books! Two of the schools showed us empty libraries, one

school was using their library room as a classroom. They need English books and novels; even the seminaries need novels and religious books so they can improve their reading skills. The only students who do not speak English are the little ones, pre-school to grade 2, so just about any type of book could be used and would be appreciated.

We met with President Hynna Motec and Youth Leader Dacca Waggai who were at St. Michael last summer. We are working with them on the office project for the District President. In addition, we are assisting with the education of the children of the New Guinea Islands District pastors and the education of seminarians within the District.

We felt we accomplished a great deal. We certainly made many lifelong friends and many students want pen-pals! If anyone is interested in being a pen-pal, please see me!
