# **Signs of Scripture**

Usually when you see the words "signs" and "scripture" in the same title, someone is preparing to talk about the Book of Revelation. In this case, however, I am actually talking about the small paper signs with a passage of scripture printed on them that are posted around the church. For the last several years, I have been posting signs near my desk with meaningful phrases, ideas and passages of scripture. When I arrive in the morning, I am reminded of these thoughts. If I am having a tough day, I look over and see a word of hope and help. If I am struggling for an idea, I often find a word of inspiration. For me, these signs are visible reminders that I am a child of God who is loved unconditionally and called to respond to that love by being God's hands and feet in the world.

A few weeks ago, I decided to add to my collection of signs, but instead of putting them in my office, I posted them around the church. Each sign contains one of my favorite passages of scripture and gives a small glimpse of the wonderful story of God's relationship with God's people. Hopefully, these signs will remind you of God's love for you, will inspire you to read the surrounding verses of scripture in your Bible and will encourage conversation about scripture among family and friends.

### Filling Your Toolbox: Lutheran Principles of Scripture Interpretation

Adapted from a presentation by the Rev. Dr. Marcus Miller, President of the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary at the Virginia Synod Assembly on June 9, 2007

Whether we realize it or not, we all read scripture through a set of lenses that are colored by our life's experience. It is helpful to know what ideas and information shape how you read and interpret scripture. Rev. Dr. Miller proposed that as Lutherans our interpretation of scripture is guided by this set of principles.

- 1. The Word of God is Jesus Christ. The Bible is like the cradle that holds the Christ child. It proclaims the story of God's relationship with God's people and reveals Jesus as God's final word.
- 2. The Bible is authoritative for us. As it says in our constitution, "This church accepts the canonical Scriptures of the Old Testament and the New Testament as the inspired Word of God and the authoritative source and norm of its proclamation, faith and life."
- 3. Scripture interprets Scripture. One of the ways that we discover what God is saying through scripture is to look at a passage in light of other teachings in scripture.
- 4. *The Bible is a public book.* Scripture is not the private domain of any one individual. Our reading of scripture is informed by the overall witness of the Christian community.
- 5. Scripture is divided into Law and Gospel. The Law is that word of God that judges, directs and orders our lives. The Gospel is that word of God that calms and comforts us and is centered in Jesus Christ. Both Law and Gospel are gifts from God and can be found in the Old Testament and the New Testament.
- 6. The Bible is more like a library than a book. The Bible is a collection of books, letters and other writings which are inspired by God. Adjusting to the different styles of writing makes it easier to understand what you are reading.
