A Helpful Word from Paul

When I was in seminary, one of our assignments was to pick a model for our ministry. I chose a song - "Jesus Loves Me." The simple, direct expression of God's love seemed like a helpful way to envision ministry. Last Sunday, I celebrated the 10th Anniversary of my Ordination and I took a few moments to rethink that old assignment and I realized that "Jesus Loves Me" has been replaced by Paul's word in the 8th Chapter of Romans.

Paul's words have helped me discover the forgiveness, mercy and compassion of God in a very personal way. Paul's words have brought me comfort in times of personal pain and loss and given me insight into how I might bring comfort to others. Paul's assurance of God's presence has given me peace of mind when making decisions. Paul's absolute confidence in God has reminded me of God's unending love for us even despite our sinfulness. Paul's words have inspired me to reach out and share the story of Jesus, so that more and more people will know God's love in their lives. Paul's words have assured me that we are never alone. I give thanks for Paul's faithfulness and wisdom on a daily basis and while I know you have heard these words before, I share them with you again, because I think they are a powerful reminder both of who we are and of the hope we have thanks to Jesus Christ our Lord.

For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. (*Roman* 8:38-39)

In the poorest parts of the world, where effective window screens are lacking, insecticide-treated bed nets are arguably the most cost-effective way to prevent malaria transmission. One bed net costs just \$10 to buy and deliver to individuals in need. One bed net can safely last a family for about four years, thanks to a long-lasting insecticide woven into the net



fabric. Last month, \$745 was generously contributed by the St. Michael family to the Nothing But Nets project sponsored by the United Nations Foundation. Thank you!

Women of the ELCA



Filling Your Toolbox: Four Key Faith Practices

The following suggestions for nurturing faith in families come from the Youth and Family Institute: www.tyfi.org. If you are looking for a new way to strengthen or share faith in your family, try adding one of the suggestions below to your life of faith.

Caring Conversations: Christian faith and values are passed on to the next generation through supportive conversation. Listening and responding to the daily concerns of our children is for them an experience of the love of God.

Devotions: Through devotions, we experience God by reflecting on the Christian story, personal faith and daily life. Reading the Bible and using devotion books helps us find ourselves in God's story and God in our stories.

Service: Children, youth and adults are most likely to be influenced by those who "walk the talk." There are many opportunities for service: some in the home, some in the congregation, some in the larger community. Whatever type of service you choose, it is best done with family members or other intergenerational groups.

Rituals and Traditions: Families identify themselves and tell their family stories through daily routines, celebrations and rituals. Whether it's hanging Christmas ornaments, or an informal liturgy before bedtime, these activities speak volumes about what the family values, believes, and how much the family values its faith.

Care of Creation Toolbox

Here are two more simple ways we can reduce our output of carbon dioxide and slow down global warming: adjust your thermostat and plant a tree. You will save up to 2000 pounds of carbon dioxide if you set your thermostat down 2 degrees in winter and up 2 degrees in the summer. One tree will remove at least 2000 pounds of carbon dioxide in its lifetime.
