**Remember the Women's Resource Center**: In October, we'll continue to collect paper supplies, e.g., toilet paper, paper towels. The collection basket is in the hallway.


In October, the WELCA members at St. Michael are encouraging our congregation to fill shoe boxes for Christmas for children in the Head Start program (ages 4-6) on the **Pine Ridge Indian reservation** in South Dakota. This gift box is often the only gift a child receives.

The contents of each box should be worth about \$15 (e.g., about 14-15 items from the Dollar Tree), including books and other educational items (especially those that help them with reading or arithmetic), crayons, pens, pencils, water colors, coloring books, toys (nothing that requires batteries, no toy guns), candy,

games, personal hygiene items like toothbrushes and toothpaste, warm hats, gloves, scarves, and socks. Boxes can also be filled for older children, but in that case, please The boxes should be identify the box with an appropriate label, e.g., "teenage girl". Empty shoe boxes are available in the narthex. We will be collecting the unwrapped. boxes through mid-November.

Many Lakota families on the Pine Ridge Reservation are without heat in their homes. The Tribal Energy Office has recommended that the best way to help people have heat is with energy efficient and safe electric heaters costing \$50 each. Donations will also be accepted for heaters. Please use the special envelopes in the pew and designate your donation for "heaters". Thank you.

St. Michael's annual giving to the VA Synod and your additional generous gifts to the ELCA make it possible for Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) to help bring God's comfort, healing and renewal to those affected by disasters. Even after the dust settles and the headlines change, LDR *stays* -- providing ongoing assistance to those in need. Here is one story of how your gifts make a difference.

When a tornado struck Enterprise, Ala., in March 2007, the members of Christ the King Lutheran Church were equipped to respond, bringing help and hope to the community.

Only 18 days before, two seminary interns had come to this small city to give a presentation at Christ the King on behalf of Lutheran Disaster Response. Prior to the presentation, many members of the congregation had never heard of LDR, a collaborative ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod.

The members of Christ the King started putting together their congregational plan, and several members agreed to serve on a disaster preparedness committee. Just over two weeks later, a devastating storm tore through the city, destroying two schools, leveling portions of downtown and residential areas, and killing eight high school students.

When Lutheran Disaster Response personnel arrived the next morning to begin assessing the situation, members at Christ the King were their first contacts. The church was soon named as the volunteer reception center for anyone coming to help, and within a month, nearly 4,000 volunteers participated in work projects around Enterprise.

Donations to <u>ELCA Domestic Disaster Response</u> fund hardship grants, spiritual and emotional care, disaster preparedness, volunteer coordination, and other relief and recovery efforts. ELCA Domestic Disaster Response is at work bringing healing and help around the country in areas like Galveston, Texas as it recovers from Hurricane Ike.
