Mother's Morning Out and Preschool Task Force Update

Beginning in October, St. Michael will host a Mother's Morning Out program on Mondays and Fridays. The program will be led by Judy Clemens and will provide social interaction for children ages 18 months to 3 ¹/₂ years old. Judy has successfully run a Mother's Morning Out for over 12 years and will continue to offer Mother's Morning Out at Blacksburg Presbyterian Church on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. The program will utilize the first room on the right in the classroom addition. For information about the cost of the program or to sign up, please contact Judy at 951-1915.

In September, the Preschool Task Force met for the first time to explore opening a preschool at St. Michael. Unlike the Mother's Morning Out program, a preschool would require approval by the congregation, the Town of Blacksburg, the Montgomery County Heath Department and at least one state agency. There are a multitude of questions to be answered before the group can begin crafting a proposal. The meeting produced a list of questions to be answered and agreement on five guiding principles for a possible preschool. Those principles include:

- 1. 1/2 Day Preschool focused on 3 -5 year olds meeting from 9 a.m. until Noon
- 2. Provide space for children with Special Needs (inclusion or self-contained)
- 3. Create a program with an Educational Focus
- 4. Create a program with a Religious Foundation
- 5. Maintain a student to staff ratio of 5:1 or less

If you would like to be a part of the Preschool Task Force, the next meeting will be at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, October 12.

Women of the ELCA

At our October meeting on Tuesday, October 19, we will be assembling Health Kits to be collected at the Fall Gathering. The meeting will be at 7 p.m. at the church.

On November 9, the Women of the ELCA will begin a year long Bible Study entitled "The People of God: Unity in the Midst of Diversity". The study will be led by Lori Anne Kirk, and held in the church fellowship hall at 6 p.m. A light supper will be served. Mark your calendars.

Remember the Food Bank: October is **cereal** month, though any kind of non-perishable food is always welcome.

Remember the Women's Resource Center: In October, we'll continue to collect paper supplies, e.g., toilet paper, paper towels. The collection basket is in the hallway.

In October, the WELCA members at St. Michael are encouraging our congregation to fill shoe boxes for Christmas for children in the Head Start program (ages 4-6) on the Pine Ridge Indian reservation in South Dakota. This gift box is often the only gift a child receives.

The contents of each box should be worth about \$15 (e.g., about 14-15 items from the Dollar Tree), including books and other educational items (especially those that help them with reading or arithmetic), crayons, pens, pencils, water colors, coloring books, toys (nothing that requires batteries, no toy guns), candy,

games, personal hygiene items like toothbrushes and toothpaste, warm hats, gloves, scarves, and socks. Boxes can also be filled for older children or adults, but in that case, please identify the box with an appropriate label, e.g., "teenage girl". These Christmas boxes will be sent to Rev. Karen Rupp, who oversees a homeless shelter on the reservation.

Plastic shoe boxes are available in the narthex. We will be collecting the filled and unwrapped boxes through mid-November and on Sunday, November 21, we will prepare the boxes for mailing at our annual Party with a Purpose.


