On April 13, youth from the New River Conference and students from Lutheran Campus Ministry at Virginia Tech spent the morning working on projects for Micah's Garden and Micah's Backpack. Part of the group sorted food drive donations and stocked shelves, while the rest of the group moved mulch and prepared flower beds. In the course of a couple of hours, these 30 youth and young adults made a tremendous impact on the feeding ministries sponsored by St. Michael and had a great time putting their faith in action.

Each and everyday, God invites us to respond to God's love for us by putting our faith in action -invites us to get our hands dirty. Now obviously, everyone can't work in Micah's Garden or help
with Micah's Backpack, but I encourage you to seek out ways that you can be God's heart and hands
