Lutherans in Action



On January 20, Lutherans from Norfolk to Winchester to Abingdon helped out with schools, distributed food at food banks and packed health kits. In the New River Valley, there were over 60 people involved in four projects. Reports are still coming in from around the state, but my guess is that at least 500 people at 20 congregations worked with local non-profits and with Lutheran organizations like National Lutheran Communities and Services and Lutheran Family Services of Virginia to make God's love known in our communities.

During the last weekend in January and the first weekend in February, the Virginia Synod of the ELCA holds Winter Celebration, a youth event for Senior High students. This year 600 to 700 youth will gather to share in music, to talk about their faith and to grow in their relationship with God. The event and the companion event for Middle School youth, Lost and Found, are among the best youth events in the country and even though we didn't have youth attend Winter Celebration this year, our support of the ministry of the Virginia Synod helps make this event possible.

Whenever there is a disaster, Lutheran Disaster Response brings hope and healing to people in need. Long after disasters like Hurricane Sandy leave the news, Lutheran Disaster Response remains to help people rebuild their lives.

These are just a few examples of the ways that Lutherans are responding to God's love and living out their faith. Micah's Closet



Since its launch last October, Micah's Closet has provided new clothes to children at Price's Fork & Kipps Elementary Schools, and to school-age clients at NRV Community Services (NRVCS) who have autism. Last November, NRVCS asked Micah's Closet to help a 16 year old boy with autism, who lives in poverty with his parents. The teen was wearing clothes which he'd outgrown over 2 years ago. Micah's Closet Shopper, Judy Clemens, generously gave of her time and energy to shop for a week's worth of new school clothes for the teen, and Micah's Closet arranged for

his social worker to take him to RunAbout Sports, and be fitted with new shoes, donated by James DeMarco, owner.

The teen's social worker reports that his attitude has <u>dramatically</u> improved. His former "hunched-over-shuffle-walk" is gone. She realized that his old (used) shoes were several sizes too big, and he needed to shuffle along to keep them from falling off his feet. Also, he'd been so ashamed of his old, ill-fitting clothes, that he walked hunched over so that he wouldn't have to look at anyone. After he put on his new clothes and new shoes, he strutted around, proudly, and announced to his social worker, "I look GOOD! I need to get out more!" Over the weeks since he received new clothes and shoes, he's become more confident, stands up straight, likes to go to school, and is eager to take part in school activities. This is just one example of how new clothes can change a child's life.

Thanks to everyone who has contributed time, energy, new clothes, and money to making a huge difference in this boy's life, and in the lives of other children who live in poverty in our community. Since its launch last October, Micah's Closet has provided over 700 items of new school clothing to 38 children in need. Thank you for your support!

No child wants to wear poverty to school.

ice, it will take place on Sunday, March 30.


