Advent Prayer Triplets and People of Passion for Council

I recently had the opportunity to spend time with a pastor and author named George Bullard who introduced me to an idea he called **Prayer Triplets**. The concept of a prayer triplet is fairly simple - three people meeting together for a defined period of time to pray for their lives, the world and their congregation.

As we move into the season of Advent, I invite you to join me in forming Advent Prayer Triplets - 3 people who commit to meet 3 times for 30 minutes for prayer during Advent. I am happy to help form triplets of interested people in the congregation who sign up or you can find two friends and neighbors in the community to join you in prayer. To help each triplet, St. Michael will provide three Prayer Guides with themes and prayer possibilities for each prayer gathering. If you are interested in getting more information or in being a part of a Prayer Triplet, please email me or sign up on the Welcome sheet.

The Advent season is also the time of year when St. Michael selects **new members for the Congregational Council**. Over the last few months, the Council has talked about our leadership selection process, about the way we identify and select Council members and about whether the time has come to shift from competitive elections to more robust nomination process. The conversation is on-going, but this year, the Council would like your help to lift up people who are passionate about the ministry of St. Michael as potential Council members. On Sunday, November 13, you will be invited to write down the name of one person in the congregation who you feel is passionate about our ministry and gifted for leadership. The names that are shared will go to the nominating team who will prayerfully consider the suggestions and assemble a list of nominees for the Congregational Meeting on December 11.

Micah's Backpack Sharing the Story

October has been a great month at MBP. A generous couple volunteered to make a run to Feeding America in Salem each month to buy our low cost food for the shelves. And Men in Mission agreed to be there to unload when they get back to the church. What a gift they are sharing with us! Dina, Kathy, Pastor John and Susan met to discuss a new fundraising strategy during the holiday season in which people can "text" a donation to

MBP. All they have to do is type in a certain number and then follow the instructions—easy and quick and a great way to reach the tech savvy younger generations! Lots of groups have been with us to pack, and we even had plenty of packers the night of the VT/Miami game! Volunteers in our community want to feed hungry children in our midst, and those volunteers are what make MBP such a success.

This month, we have been feeding approximately 300 children each week (some weeks a few more, some weeks a few less). Each packing night we have had between 30-70 volunteers. And right now our cost is somewhere between \$4-5/bag. Food drives are starting to pick up with several big ones happening in the next few months. We are so grateful for all food donations.

If you are at the grocery store this **November** and want to pick up something for MBP, feel free to grab snack items like granola bars, fruit snacks, or individual cheez-it packs.




Party with a Purpose on Sunday, November 13 at 5 PM

Montgomery County Christmas Store Donations

Chrismon Workshop - November 19

Chrismon Ornaments were originated and first made for use on the Christmas tree of Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia, in 1957. The designs were monograms of and symbols for our Lord Jesus Christ. Because these designs have been used by his followers since biblical times, they are the heritage of all Christians and serve to remind each of us of the One we follow.



Each Christmas, St. Michael decorates our tree with Chrismons and this year we are going to have a workshop of Saturday, Nov. 19 to make new Chrismons for our tree. Lunch and Learn will be Monday, November 21, at noon at the church: This month's Lunch and Learn is titled "Paul and the power of failure: when God chooses the unlikely". No one on earth would ever have looked at Paul's resume and thought, "apostle." In fact, no one on earth did! But God chose Paul, a man with a dubious past and a shaky present,

to lead and guide the early church into the future. Let's explore how can Paul's failings helps us come to terms with a God who chooses the unlikely-including your and me.

This gift is often the only Christmas gift a child receives. There are plastic shoe boxes available in the front hallway with notes offering suggestions on the content. Some ideas include educational items that will help with math, spelling or reading as well as a small toy and perhaps gloves or mittens, packaged toothbrushes, etc. Sunday evening November 13 at 5 p.m. we will have dinner catered by Greeks' Restaurant

and Grill, then prepare the boxes, followed by evening worship.
