



July has been a great month at Micah's Mobile Backpack. Each week has brought more and more kids who need food. We wish the increase didn't happen because that would mean that kids have enough to eat, but we are very glad we can meet the need.



Sadly, at the end of the month, Susan Verbrugge, current Director of MBP, announced that she needed to resign due to increased duties as she takes care of her aging mother. She is very sad to have to make the decision, but knows that it is the right one for her and her family. She will continue to be a huge supporter of MBP and will help in the transition in any way she can. This month, we have served 240 children, sending out 891 bags of food. That is a huge amount for a summer month. We are thrilled that they are receiving not only bags of food, but also lots of fresh veggies from Micah's Garden along with blueberries from Three Birds' Berry Farm.

For **August**, feel free to bring **individual servings of mac and cheese** to help feed hungry kids.



#### St. Michael Youth News

While at **Youth Synod Assembly** in June, we mainly were involved with worship, service and fellowship. Add the threes together and we were able to become closer with our fellow Lutherans, our friends and most importantly, God.

We opened the Youth Synod Assembly with a small worship service. We were able to commune and give peace with the Bishop, himself! As I do in most Synod events, I was able to attend the end of the weekend with a beautiful service at St. Andrews Cathedral. I was able to share this experience with friends and many pastors I know, as well. The services allowed me to truly become closer to God.

During the Youth Synod Assembly, we were able to work with a few people from the Synod. Two main examples of what we worked on include developing a women and justice statement with Judy Casteele, where we talked about the issues surrounding sexism today, and the Tapestry Team lead by Rev. Lyndon Sayers. We discussed the topics and wrote a statement on gender equality in the LGBTQIA+ community.

During Youth Assembly we were able to grow into a stronger church. With our small groups, we got to know each other very well, even allowing time for a book. In Chat Rooms, we were able to discuss anything from relationships with technology to Chipotle or Moe's. We even had the opportunity to get to know our Bishop a little better. He shared a heartwarming tale about his wife. In addition, when asked the question, "Dino nuggets or regular nuggets?" he responded, "What are dino nuggets?" I was glad to see the people I already knew, as well.

I really enjoyed going to my first Virginia Youth Synod Assembly this year. I learned so much and had so much fun. I hope to attend next year, too! –Jack Graves

Five of our youth attended the 2018 Youth Gathering in Houston. The event's theme was This Changes Everything. Besides our youth, three youth and Pastor Terrie went from Trinity in Pulaski and one youth and Pastor Wanda went from Our Saviour. The youth met four times in preparation for the event and will meet again on August 5 to review their experiences. St. Michael youth will share their experiences at the Second Sunday Brunch on August 12. Come join them for brunch and to hear more of their stories.

While in Houston, our group participated in many things. We had Synod Day, Service Learning Day, Interactive Learning Day, and many other activities. However, I have to say that my favorite thing we did was worshipping with 30,000 of my peers at the worship service. I have never felt God like I did when I was singing the praises and reciting the Nicene Creed with other Lutherans from across the country. I can't think of a more moving and simply beautiful thing than hearing our service being delivered in multiple languages (including sign language), making it easy for every single one of us, regardless of race, or gender, or disability to unite as one in the joy of the word of God. While I certainly loved the singing, dancing, and general praising of the Lord, communion was an experience unlike any I've known. One would think it would take ages for 30,000 people to receive communion, but it only took around 15 minutes! Two people each holding a chalice of wine and one person holding a plate of bread stood at the end of about every two rows in the stadium. Row by row, we went up and received our communion. As we were walking to receive ours, the rows behind and in front of us gave us high fives and warm smiles. It was easy to see and feel Christ through every single person who high-fived you. As a whole, the worship service was very moving and I am immensely grateful that I was able to be a part of something so lovely. -- Jessie Brown

#### Happy 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary St. Michael

On September 15, 1968, St. Michael Lutheran Church became an active congregation.

Beginning September 9 through September 23, 2018, we will be celebrating our 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary with several events, beginning with an **Open House and special "historical" service on Sunday, September 9**. The following **Sunday, September 16, will be the anniversary worship service and luncheon**, with Bishop Robert Humphrey as our special guest. Pastor John Wertz and Pastor Linda Mitchell Motley will be with us as well. And finally, on **Sunday, September 23, we'll plant batches of 50 flower bulbs** around the church property, accompanied by special music and a light lunch. It's just party, party, party at St. Michael in September. Mark those dates on your calendars.



Before we begin our celebration, perhaps it's time to recall our earliest beginnings. As congregations go, St. Michael Lutheran Church is a relatively new congregation, organized in 1968. But her story is deeply rooted in the early history of the region. During the middle years of the 18<sup>th</sup> century, pioneers from the palatinate of Germany found their way into the New River Valley via Philadelphia and the Shenandoah Valley. The earliest record of a worship service in the New River German settlement is November 20, 1749, when a Moravian missionary by the name of Schnell preached the first sermon.



Around 1750, a Sanctuary reputed to be the first Lutheran church west of the Alleghenies and the third Lutheran church in Virginia was built on the site we presently occupy. The original log structure was replaced by a brick building in 1830. First known as St. Michael's Church, it was subsequently called Price's Church, then St. Peter's Church. About 1885, the brick building had become unsafe and was demolished. A school building which occupied our site was used for worship for another 15 years.

Meanwhile, Lutherans at Price's Fork, just a mile west, wanted a church in their own community. Completed in 1878, the new church was called St. Mark's Lutheran Church. The loss of the church building and the transfer of members to St. Marks took its toll on St. Peter's Church. In 1902, the

remaining membership moved into a new building in the Glade community, which was called New St. Peters Church.

Over the years, the nine Lutheran congregations in Montgomery County were yoked in a variety of parish alignments. From 1951 until 1968, New St. Peter's, St. Mark's, Shiloh, and New Mt. Zion were joined as the New River Parish, served by one pastor.
