Micah's Backpack Sharing the Story

Here is MBP in a nutshell right now:

- Donations accepted on Mondays from 10:30-12:30 at the church
- Donations can be made online as well on our website
- We are not accepting volunteers for packing currently
- Bags are being packed and delivered in a "drive-thru" style on Mondays from 3:00-6:00 at the church. Families can drive up and get bags, books, and produce (when available).





Micah's Mobile Backpack has been discontinued until further notice.

While our daily lives have seemed everything but normal, one of the consonants has been nature and her unpredictability. The winter was mild and the spring was chilly. Summer officially begins soon and the garden has been amazing. We will be harvesting peas soon to be delivered to local families. The potatoes are growing at warp



speed. We have peppers and cucumbers blooming. The garden is also rich with nutritious sweet potatoes, carrots, beans, tomatoes, summer and winter squash plants. Bring on the sun and rain!





We have been able to deliver food to our senior friends at Warm Hearth in May and June. With the help from Feeding America and Warm Hearth, we have been able to pack the bags at the church and have the employees at Warm Hearth pick them up and distribute them to the seniors. We have packed and given out 100 bags each

month. The bags are "generic" and we have not been able to pack to the normal menu requested items, but we are sure they are giving any items that they cannot use to the other people in the buildings. We anticipate following this same pattern for the next several months as Warm Hearth continues to have certain guidelines they must follow, as does our church.

Special thanks to Doug Smiley and Mickey McGuigan who have gone to Feeding America to pick up the food each month. We have limited our packing group at the church to only four people.

We certainly appreciate everyone's support as we continue this special mission to feed our friends at Warm Hearth. They are always thankful for the bags that bring some needed help each month.




Jim and Judy Clemens who will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary on June 27.

Mask Maker, Mask Maker make me a mask. Mama's Side Hustle by Jane Swing

When COVID-19 raised its ugly head and all my part-time jobs stopped, I wondered about what to do next. Wait... I have a sewing machine. I have lots of fabric stuck away in boxes. The experts said it was a good idea to wear a mask. So, I started searching the internet to see what I could find in terms of patterns and directions. My original intent was to use up idle fabric and provide some protection for my family and friends. I made masks and sent them to my family and my neighbors. Other people saw them and asked if I could make some for them. My Facebook site was overflowing with inquiries and I couldn't keep them all straight. In stepped my two youngest children. My daughter created "Marvelous Masks by Jane" on Facebook. My son created a website. We posted pictures of fabric, completed masks, and family and friends wearing the masks. Our niche in this little venture is to let people chose a print that reflects the person behind the mask. Many people called and wanted to "stop by and pick up a few masks." We explained that we make the masks as they are ordered and so it would take a few days to get masks made and then out to the customer. There was a period of time when I wasn't sure I would be able to keep up. I decided I would charge for the masks and donate a portion to Micah's Backpack and Micah's Soup for Seniors programs at church. I make three different sizes of masks: child size, regular adult and larger adult. We have prints in many categories. Of course in this area, anything Virginia Tech is popular but I have made UVA, Tennessee, Auburn and Ohio State. Hobby themes are popular as well as dogs, cats and other animals. I have lots of red, white and blue prints, all colors of florals and lots of solids. We've shipped masks all over these United States: Alaska! Michigan! Minnesota! California! North Carolina! New Jersey! Florida! Tennessee! and Texas! We had s special order from Pella Window in Greensboro for black and yellow masks so their employees would be prepared to enter customers' homes and businesses. We just shipped an order of 25 Girl Scouts masks to a troop in California. We have one customer who finds her own fabric for her family and friends and brings it to us to make the masks, then she distributes them. I've met many people at church by making masks. I hope all my church family has masks so we'll be prepared for the time we can again gather and worship face to face but six feet apart. Do I think we will be wearing masks for some time? Yes, and I have fall, Halloween, Thanksgiving and December holiday fabrics to

prove it. Please don't hesitate to contact us if you are in need of a mask or masks.

Gathering Again: Guidance for Congregational Leaders in the Virginia Synod, ELCA May 14, 2020

We know everyone is eager to gather in-person for worship and that Safer at Home Phase 1 of Forward Virginia allows for religious organizations to gather again at 50% capacity. However, the highly infectious nature of COVID-19, the lack of available testing, the absence of an effective treatment for the disease, and the time needed to prepare for gathering again leads the Bishop's Office to recommend abstaining from in-person gatherings through Forward Virginia Safer at Home Phase 1, Phase 2, and possibly beyond. As each new Phase of reopening occurs in Virginia, congregational leaders will need to consider how to protect the health and well-being of the entire community, not simply do what is allowable or legal.

As you prepare to gather again when it is safer and legal, please remember these considerations:

- Our objective is NOT to return to in-person gatherings. **Our call is to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ!** As followers of Jesus, we also have a call to protect our members and the wider community. (Galatians, 5:13-14)
- If we are distracted by our own desires, financial concerns, or the noise around us, we may find ourselves working hard to gather again only to discover in doing so we put the most vulnerable in our congregations and communities at greater risk. We must not let that happen. (Philippians 2:3-4)
- The risks of COVID-19 come primarily from the air we breathe; COVID-19 is spread through respiratory droplets (meaning moisture that comes from talking, singing, coughing and sneezing) and the aerosol literally, the air we share, (talking and breathing). This article provides a helpful overview of the science around potential transmission: The Risks Know Them Avoid Them
- We are **obligated to follow the legal and medical directives** provided by governing authorities. An updated list of requirements can be found at: https://www.virginia.gov/coronavirus/forwardvirginia/#856622
- Check with your **insurance carrier** to examine their guidelines to limit your liability risks.
- Clearly communicate all of your plans multiple times, ways and places.
- Develop a plan to **notify the congregation** if someone in a gathering develops COVID-19.
- Be sure to develop clear expectations and guidelines for outside groups using church facilities.
- Remember that pandemics often come in waves that **may require a retreat from our progress** in gathering again to an earlier phase or "stay-at-home" orders.

Gathering Again for Worship

For the foreseeable future, the safest way to gather for worship is online. Congregations are encouraged to continue to offer digital worship opportunities through all Phases of Forward Virginia and beyond.

While the Office of the Bishop recommends not gathering for worship in Phase 1 and Phase 2 of Forward Virginia, now is the time to prepare for the future. The Virginia Synod staff prepared a Gathering Again document, but, after reviewing ELCA Considerations, based on Federal Guidelines, we decided not to duplicate their efforts. While the ELCA guidance does not align exactly with the Forward Virginia Phases of reopening, it is thorough, linked to additional resources and can be easily adapted to fit guidance from our Synod and the Forward Virginia Phases. We ask that you carefully read and follow ELCA Considerations before gathering again in-person in any context. Go to: wasynod.org/gathering-again for document links.
