Greetings Body of Christ,

A very prominent image for the Church in the New Testament is that of "the body of Christ." This is especially true for Romans 12 and 1 Corinthians 12 where Paul emphasizes the unity of the Church: we are many parts of one body. This image brings out the multifaceted diversity that seems so relevant for the Church in its present context. The many parts of the body are all different from each other, yet all are necessary. The hand cannot say to the foot, I do not need you.

The theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer reminds us that the unity of the Church as the Body of Christ is not a goal to be attained but a fact to be recognized. We do not have to "strive to become the body of Christ," we are the Body of Christ. We are all part of one Body, whether we realize it or not. What happens to one of us affects the whole body whether we realize it or not. The mission of the Church according to this image is not to achieve unity but to act as the unified entity that we are. This image also implies that the Church embodies Christ's continuing presence in the world and so acts as Christ in the world. The Church serves and suffers for the world as Christ served and suffered for the world. In many ways, the mission of the Church as the Body of Christ is simply to continue doing what Jesus did.

For this reason, the Bible often describes the work of the Church as simply bearing fruit. In Matthew, this metaphor implies a natural activity, something that one does simply because of what one is. In the gospel of John, Jesus says, "I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing." This is an excellent statement of what it means to "be Church" and of what the mission of the Church is. To "be Church" is to abide in Christ and the mission of the Church is to bear the fruit that Christ produces in us.

I am in awe of the various ways I see the body of Christ growing and producing fruit in the midst of this pandemic. In what might seem to be bleak circumstances, the Holy Spirit is still faithfully calling, gathering, enlightening and sanctifying the body of Christ. We don't have to look far to see the church's mission to care for God's people in need, hear of God's love through Word and Sacrament, respond to God's grace with thankful hearts, invite others into Christ's community, serve God in our daily lives, and tell the story of God's love for all being brought to fruition in the community of believers.

Already this year we have had new people joining the church's mission, new council members installed, finances for Micah's Caring Initiative strengthened, a mini pantry become a reality, and Vicar Bryan Katz being ordained to the ministry of Word and Sacrament, becoming Pastor Bryan Katz. This all came about because the Holy Spirit is at work within you. It is God's very spirit dwelling within us that brings about the body of Christ. I can't begin to tell you how blessed we are at St. Michael to see evidence of the Holy Spirit at work within our midst. To be made privy to what God is birthing forth should cause us to stop what we are doing and take notice. This should stir our souls and bring us to worship our God, who is indeed faithful when we are not. I know there is a pandemic that is causing suffering in our world, but rest assure God is still alive, acting on our behalf in ways we don't want to miss.

We have reconfigured the fellowship hall and set up Suzanne's office in the MBP room. This has allowed MBP to be mobile because our shelving is on wheels. This has also expanded our fellowship hall to allow for more seating. Thank you to Jeff Birch and the Men in Mission team, Doug and Jody Smiley, Mickey McGuigan, John Krallman, John Kell, Gary Worley and Philip Isenhour for making

this all possible. Thank you to Pastor Michelle and the church council for being open to this vision.

I am humbled and pleased to announce the advisory board of Micah's Initiative has invited me to continue in the position of director of Micah's Backpack Program. Micah's Soup for Seniors

We are continuing to pack and distribute 100+ bags to the seniors at Warm Hearth. We are still packing the bags at the church with 4 volunteers and then the staff at Warm Hearth picks up the bags about 4-5 days later and distributes them to the seniors. At this time, we are packing generic bags and not offering our normal "menu" option as in the past. This seems to be working well and the bags contain quite a few



of the basic items- tuna/ peanut butter/ soup / spaghetti / cereal / fruit cups and crackers.

We are excited we have found a way to still help out the low-income seniors at Warm Hearth and look forward to continuing our program in this manner. We appreciate everyone's support as we feed those in need. We will be collecting small cans of **tuna** in February/March. You may drop off those donations at the church.

Thanks to your donations and grants from Thrivent, we were able to supply slipper socks, lotions and also fresh fruit in our January delivery.



Happy New Year from the garden. Although the garden is quietly awaiting spring, there is still activity buzzing. We have a new addition thanks to Scout Troop 158 and soon to be Eagle Scout Fitz Cooper. We had beautiful strawberry plants donated a few years ago that have been in much need of a raised bed. Fitz (with a little family

help) made 3 separate beds for the garden and we will soon fill them with strawberry plants! In addition to this, we received a grant from New River Master Gardeners for \$640! We will use the money to add fresh topsoil to the garden. This small garden continues to amaze me by producing over 1,000 pounds of fresh produce annually. A little hard work, soil, sun, rain and faith seem to equal full baskets. Anyone wanting to volunteer some time to do a little outdoor fellowship work, please contact St. Michael as I'm sure there is a place we can use your help. COVID-19 Vaccinations

The New River Health District is operating in Vaccine Phase 1b.

On Thursday January 14, Governor Northam authorized the New River Health District to expand COVID-19 vaccines to people age 65 or over and people age 16-64 with qualifying health conditions.

To get the vaccine, you must pre-register, and then you will be contacted to make an appointment. Pre-registration is not the same as making an appointment. Do not go to a vaccination site without an appointment.

Vaccine Pre-Registration

(Updated January 26, 2021)

To receive a vaccine, you must first pre-register.

Please note: Pre-registering DOES NOT GUARANTEE AN APPOINTMENT OR A VACCINATION. As vaccines are available, VDH will contact pre-registered individuals to schedule an appointment at a local health department, pharmacy or other healthcare provider.

- 1. Pre-register by providing contact information.
- 2. Wait to receive an appointment. This may take several weeks.
- 3. Arrive at appointment on time with appropriate documentation.

Who Should Pre-register?

We are vaccinating people in Phase 1b, which includes

- frontline essential workers,
- people age 75 and over,
- people age 65-74, and
- people age 16-64 with underlying medical conditions.

We will schedule each category in that order.

We are currently scheduling people age 65-74, with appointments filled through the beginning of March. People age 65-74 or 16-64 with underlying medical conditions should pre-register.

If you are in Phase 1a or age 75 and over but have not yet had a vaccine appointment scheduled, call (540) 838-8222 and explain your situation. We will prioritize you.

Please do NOT sign up if you are not in Phase 1b. Other phases may use different systems and signing up if you are not in Phase 1b may delay your vaccination. For more information about Phase 1b and which Phase includes you, visit our <u>COVID-19 Vaccinations</u> page.
