Blessings Body of Christ,

What is church? The Greek word (*ekklesia*) translated as *church* is not an uncommon word in the New Testament. It simply means assembly. Sometimes it refers to a gathering of God's people for the purpose of sacred worship and other times it refers to a secular gathering to conduct municipal business.

When *ekklesia* is used in the sacred sense it becomes clear that gathering, assembling, and meeting together are vital aspects not only of Christian identity, but also of the holy functioning of God's people: And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near. (Hebrews 10:24–25)

As Christians, the gathering together with the saints to worship God is vitally important for our spiritual health, as well as for our own identity as members of Christ's body. Consider the following ten reasons why we gather as God's people.

- **1. To Obey God's Commands to Gather -** So many of Christ's commands to the church cannot be met if we're not meeting together. From communion to gathering around the water and the word, to mutual prayer, to loving one another and more, the "going to" is essential.
- **2.** To Re-Focus on God in Worship Something extraordinary happens when individual members of Christ's body gather to worship him. We can and should worship God in all places and times but gathering in corporate worship helps us focus more on Christ and less on ourselves. That matters, a lot.
- **3. To Connect with a Local Body -** Singing together matters. Praying together matters. Working, learning, talking, and seeking together: all of it matters.
- **4.** To Serve the Body of Christ Love and service require proximity. Yes, we can do a lot of good things remotely and I'm grateful for the online options available during the recent pandemic, but there are some forms of service to one another that simply cannot be done unless we're in the same place together.
- **5. To Learn and Grow in Faith -** The gathered church should challenge us. It should push us. At times it should irritate us. It should bless us by all its multi-faceted expressions. (continued on next page)

- **6. To Regulate Our Life Rhythms -** When we miss church we should notice it. It should affect our body, soul, and spirit in ways that cause longing. Connecting with the community of believers at least once a week provides a rhythm of life that we need.
- **7. To Practice Sabbath -** Sabbath has two essential elements, rest and worship. Without worship, it's just a day off. Without rest, it can quickly become legalistic and exhausting.
- **8.** To Stay Grounded Spiritually Gathering with other believers keeps us balanced. Being with God's people links us, our life and our thoughts to the real world, real people, and their real needs
- **9. To De-individualize Our Faith -** Worship is both a personal and public activity. A serious look at the Bible shows that the public aspect of worship is spoken of far more often than the private, personal aspect.
- **10. To Honor the Persecuted Church -** For 2,000 years and counting, Christians have faced persecution throughout the world. This is easy to forget when we live in a country where we're not just free to worship, but where Christianity is the dominant religious expression. Most persecuted Christians could be believers without any recrimination if they just did one thing, kept it to themselves. But they go to church, even at the risk of persecution and death, because they know Christians need to gather.

We are getting ready to make changes to the menu along with adding some personal care items every other month to the bags. It has been several years since the menu has changed and we are looking forward to the changes and feel the new items

will benefit the seniors. New items will include single serve portions such as small cans of vegetables, small microwavable rice and potatoes, beanie weenies, small boxes of cereal and small cans of beef stew. Since most of our seniors live by themselves, receiving single serve portions will help eliminate waste when preparing meals.

The decision to change the menu and add personal items came about after having conversations with the seniors on what items they needed. We will be asking for donations from the congregation for those personal care items and will use Thrivent grants to make up the difference. We are pleased to make these changes and look forward to continued support of the Micah's Soup for Seniors program at Warm Hearth. We invite anyone interested in packing and distributing the bags to join us the 4th Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m.
