Welcome to the Summer Solstice

As we settle into the long hot days of summer, as people embark upon summer travel, and the church settles into the summer Sunday doldrums, I find myself obsessing with the question of where God is leading us in regard to COVID, inflation and loss of members. All this can feel overwhelming and personal at times when I reflect on the advent of my arrival. I love the church and its people, but more than that, I Love God and I long to see God's glory revealed through the church: the kind of glorious display that would make us fall on our knees in praise and worship; the kind of glory that is undeniably God; the kind that would awake me, awake us, from summers hypnotic heat and fill us to the point that the church would be bursting at the seams.

Where is God leading us in the still quiet of summer? In all my questioning I have become keenly aware of the reality that God is the Creator, I am not. God is great, we are not. I wonder if this reality chafes us or relieves us? How we answer that question will determine who we are as a community. In our social mediacrazed culture everyone is a star. There is a sense of overly exaggerated self importance looming in our society and a sense of smallness has become unacceptable. The entire Internet sends out daily reminders that we are not successful unless everyone knows us and is talking about us over dinner. The church has always wrestled with desiring greatness, hence why there are a staggering number of 200 plus denominations in the US, but few generations have faced the draw of aggrandizement as this one.

It's impossible to continually behold and be dazzled by our own achievements and power while attributing all greatness and glory to God. The two cannot coexist in the same heart. We either become motivated by our sense of self-promotion or we are shaped by our understanding of God's preeminence. Even King David recognized his smallness, not of value, but of power compared to God's power.

O LORD, what are humans that you regard them, or mortals that you think of them? They are like a breath; their days are like a passing shadow. Psalm 144:3-4

Our relative smallness is not a declaration of worth or value, nor does it determine God's attentiveness to our needs as the church. In the very next Psalm David writes about the responsiveness of God to his people.

The Lord is near to all who call on him, to all who call on him in truth. He fulfills the desire of all who fear him; he also hears their cry and saves them. Psalm 145:18-19

Smallness is the posture of the heart. Rather than stressing out to stake our claim or secure our place of greatness, we can be confident in the knowledge that God's glory is already there. The church's position of humility in the shadow of God's great power is one that offers us relief and freedom because God is near, fulfilling, hearing, and saving God's beloved church. In order for the church to behold God's glory we need to better understand God's greatness in and through our smallness. In weakness God is strong.

We are continuing to pack and distribute 90 bags to the seniors at Warm Hearth. We have made changes to the menu by adding smaller canned items and we have received excellent response to the changes. We are also adding some personal care items to the bags. It has been several years since the menu has changed and we are

excited about those changes. We are adding more items that are single serve portions, such as small cans of vegetables, small microwavable rice and potatoes, beanie weenies, small boxes of cereal and small cans of beef stew. Since most of our seniors live alone, receiving single serve portions will help eliminate waste when preparing meals. Also, every other month, we will add some personal care items. This change and our decision to change the menu came about after some conversations with the Seniors on what items they needed. We will be asking for donations from the congregation on those personal care items and will use Thrivent Grants to make up the difference.

We are excited about the changes and look forward to our continued support of Micah's Soup for Seniors program at Warm Hearth. We invite anyone interested in packing and distributing the bags to join us the 4th Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m.

Personal items to donate: August – brushes and combs; October - tissues (small) and hand lotions; December - slipper socks

LAUNCH at Roanoke College July 10-14, 2022


