Dear people of God,

While on vacation in Florida John and I spent much of our evenings chasing the sunset. The sky lights up with magnificent hues of pink, orange, and red around the burning yellow sun. Like a child I always strain to hear it sizzle as it hits the gulf waters, although deep down I know it is only a myth. The sun setting always brings about a sense of awe in me. It is the realization of God's faithfulness and generosity towards us.

Of all the ways we can show love perhaps the most tangibly communicated is that of remaining: a child who remains by an ailing parent's side, a pastor and congregation who remain steadfast to the church week after week, a spouse who remains loyal to the other, a friend who remains even when things are difficult. To remain is to look past the inconveniences, the faults, and the less than ideal, and to say with feet planted and heart unwavering, "I am not going anywhere."

To behold the steadfast faithfulness of God day after day is to witness God's unchanging nature, God's relentless orchestration of time and space, and God's care over the earth's daily rotation. God remains faithful with each trip around the sun. Each day that passes God displays the reliability of his presence in the most tangible way possible by remaining with us throughout time and space.
