CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home or small group:

- If you could do anything you wanted, what would you like to do?
- Many cultures have been based on the power to dominate others instead of serving others. Where do you see power over others happening around you? Where do you see service?
- Jesus uses his power as Savior to serve all. How does that influence how you live?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Mark 10:35-45.

In the time of Jesus, the Roman Empire was an honor and shame culture. Power was used to protect those in authority. Therefore, those in power were able to honor others to keep them loyal as well as use their influence to shame and humiliate people to keep them in line. Using power to dominate others was central to society. How is that still true today? Jesus turns all that on its head. He humiliates domination by being the Son of Man willing to die for others. He takes humiliation and gives it honor. The cross of Christ humbles religious, political, economic, and social powers and honors what appears to be weakness. Human skills, huge bank accounts, and social power are only valued as it is used to serve others, not in their abilities to shine a spotlight on themselves and say, “Look at me.” How does the cross of Christ free your life from the bondage of pursuing personal glory? How does it free you to serve others?

Pray: **Lord, we are humbled by your willingness to die for us and forgive us our weaknesses. Help us to walk in your way. Amen.**

SERVICE



For Jesus and his kingdom, service is a way of life that seeks to honor others and not claim to have power over others. This week think about how your life leads you to honor and value others.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Obviously, James and John were not listening to the words of Jesus that spoke of his suffering and death (Mark 10:33-37). Sometimes we only hear what we want to hear without listening to others, including God. A valuable Christian tradition is to sit in silence and listen for God to speak to us the message of the kingdom of God, the message of Christ, the Son of Man. Take time this week to sit in silence and listen for how God wants to speak to you with the voice of the one who “came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many” (Mark 10:45).
